Elizabeth Woodville was one of 13 children born to Richard Woodville (later named Baron Rivers) and Jacquetta of Luxembourg, widow of Henry V's brother John, Duke of Bedford. Parliament declared that as Edward IV's marriage to Elizabeth Woodville was invalid and the children of Richard of Gloucester's older brother, George Duke of Clarence had been denied succession rights, then Richard was the rightful King.
